Dear Sir,

I am very deeply grateful to you for the exquisite volume of cartoons which I received this morning. It is indeed very kind of you to send these to me and I cannot speak too highly of the work contained in your production. I have shown them to-day to several of my friends here in London and they share with me the view that it is impossible to see your work without being impressed by the horror of the present situation.

In the last letter which I had from you you suggested that there was a possibility of these being published in England. I hope that this is so and that these cartoons will very soon make their appearance here, with of course an English text, as most people here are unfortunately unacquainted with your language.

In the event of these being published here I wonder whether you will agree to a proposal that perhaps two of them - any two which you wish - might be published in such a paper as, for example, the "Daily Graphic", together with a description



which I think would only have the effect of increasing the sale of the publication. I think I could arrange this for you. I should be glad if you could let me know how the matter of the English publication stands.
